English -Tom's Midnight garden – week 4

Over the next two weeks you are going to be writing a story using Tom's Midnight garden as a basis.

This week, we shall do some grammar work and sentence work to help with your story, watch the next episodes of the story, disect the story structure and plan your own story. (You can use the template on Purple mash to plan if you wish)

In description during the story you will write, there has to be very vivid images created so the reader knows exactly what the two places look and feel like.

First try a couple of activities to improve descriptive writing.

1. Creating descriptive lists.

Look at these sentences. Notice the use of the comma and how it doesn't appear before the word 'and' in the lists, and the list is introduced by a colon.

Unusually, the large dining table was full of food: slices of roast chicken, bowls of crisp salad, jars of stewed fruit and plates of sweet puddings.

The kitchen was full of delicious smells: steaming fruit pies, fresh strawberries and glasses of freshly squeezed orange juice.

Can you try creating five sentences describing food. Make a list of favourite foods and brainstorm possible adjectives before creating new descriptive lists, building up noun phrases to describe food, *On the table, he could see chunks of cheese, tasty teacakes and plates of buttery crumpets.*

2. Using comparisons

Comparing things emphasises the shape, size, look or smell or an item. It is similar to a simile but doesn't use 'like' but instead uses 'than' to draw a comparison.

The tree was taller than an ancient oak tree.

The strawberries tasted sweeter than sugar.

Can you try to create some comparison sentences for these images – use all your senses.









Now we can look at how to include speech in the story using correct punctuation.

Here are a reminder of the rules for you:

The inverted commas surround what is actually said including the punctuation

You need to have a comma before the speech

Speech starts with a capital letter!

So for example.....

James yawned, 'When are we going home?'

Using these rules, correct these sentences - are there any other mistakes to correct?

Now write a couple of your own examples.

The final activity this week is looking at the story, boxing it up and then using that structure to create your own story based in lockdown.

The main character of your story is going to be yourself but you must write in 3rd person. (using yourself means that you can use your own feelings and activities in lockdown and something in your home as a portal so you should be able to describe it well)

Can you complete your own story plan, the past could be anytime – during the war, the musical sixties, the 1980's - its up to you – maybe add pictures to help your plan
