
Outburst is a synonym for anger/shouting.

And then she turned back in the doorway and said, "Don't say best wishes from Fraulein Lambeck, little Anna—just say from an admirer!"—before she finally swept out.

Fraulein Lambeck is a over the top, and exaggerates the truth
